background & history

1985-2000

Urban expansion
Independence, 7th, and other compromises
Elizabeth Small Area Plan & National Historic District
Elizabeth Local Historic District

background & history

2019 - PRESENT

Small group of neighbors met to educate themselves on local historic district, determine feasibility and approach

Neighbors hold initial information session Fall 2019; conduct survey

Neighbors efforts to collaborate with ECA board are unsuccessful

Historic Elizabeth Neighborhood Foundation (HENF) takes ownership and pursues Local Historic District effort



EARLY 2022

HENF begins information campaign via Elizabeth Community Newsletter; meets with local leaders and city officials

SUMMER 2022

HENF hires SVM Historical Consulting to update the 1988 survey related to the original applications for local and national historic districts

WINTER 2023

Updated survey is completed, showing 19% loss in contributing properties since 1988, or 232 lost buildings

HENF has begun the administrative process to complete the required paperwork for a local historic district. **Emphasis: compliance**

AN APPROXIMATE TIMELINE

2021 GRASS ROOTS SURVEY RESULTS

We spoke to **276** different **homeowners** across the neighborhood, representing 75% of all owner-occupied homes in the neighborhood.



EARLY RESULTS72% IN FAVOR

72% of respondents were supportive (4 or 5), with 55% of all responses being a 5 (highly supportive)

16% of respondents were neutral (3)

12% of respondents were not supportive (1 or 2)

the case for change. accepting controls in exchange for control



19% OF HISTORIC STRUCTURES LOST SINCE 1988

No action is highly consequential. Status quo ensures continued demolition of historic structures at an alarming pace.

UDO & STREETCAR

City's new UDO takes effect this summer and will promote density throughout Elizabeth. The Gold Line streetcar, like the light rail, is intended to spur development.

BEST AVAILABLE OPTION

While not perfect, there is not a viable alternative that offers a better solution.

what a local historic district does

PLACES ZONING CONTROLS ON YOUR PROPERTY

These controls require review of new work, changes, and a number of other matters. The reviews can involve cost and time. And admittedly at times, they will feel like a pain.

RESULTS IN DEMOLITION STAYS (365 DAYS)

Any developer or home owner wanting to tear down a structure within the historic district will have to wait 365 days before proceeding. This allows for thoughtful alternatives before demolition.

RESULTS IN CONTROLS ON DEVELOPERS, RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL

Allows for feedback and design standards to help inform construction materials and massing.

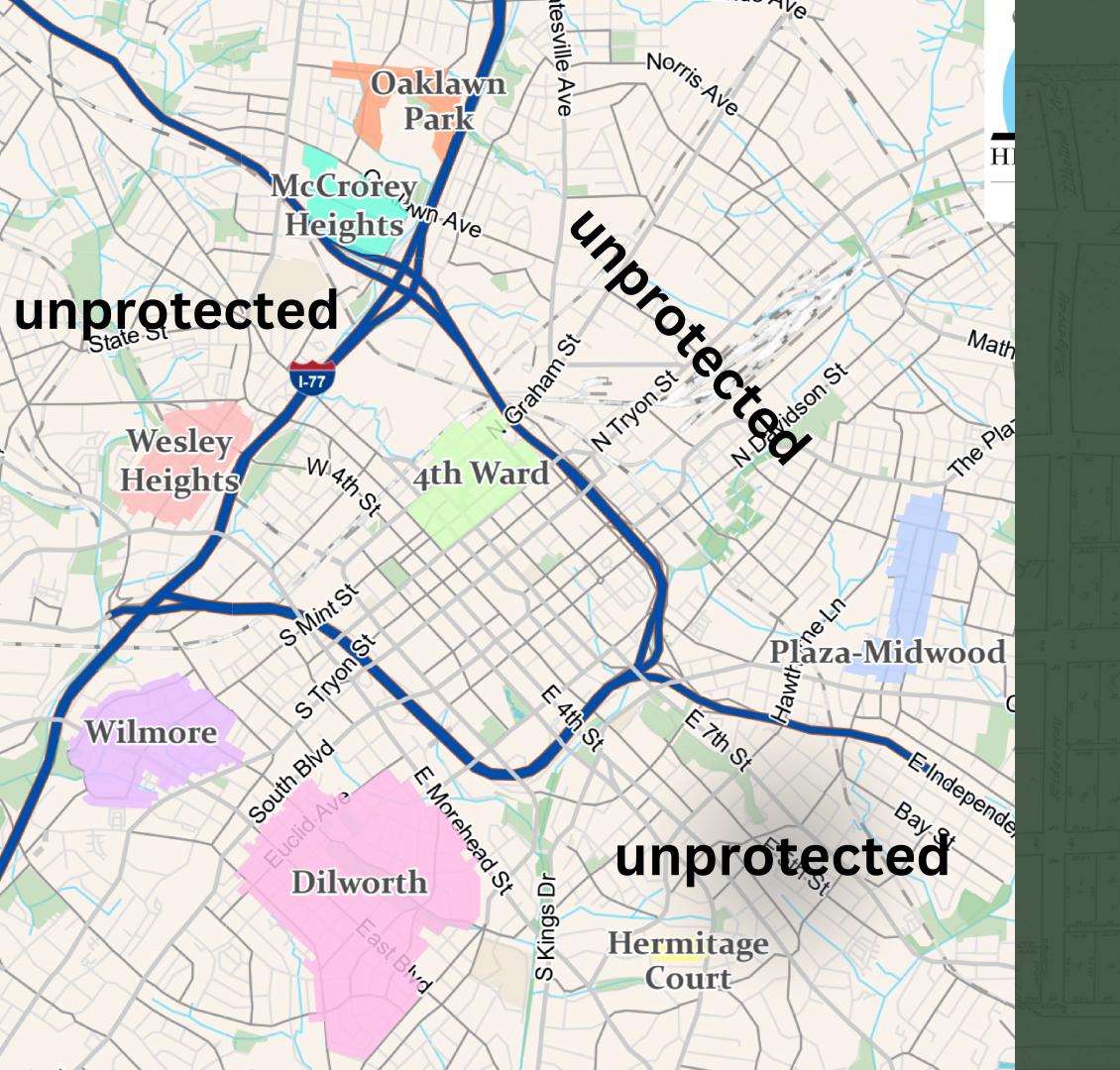

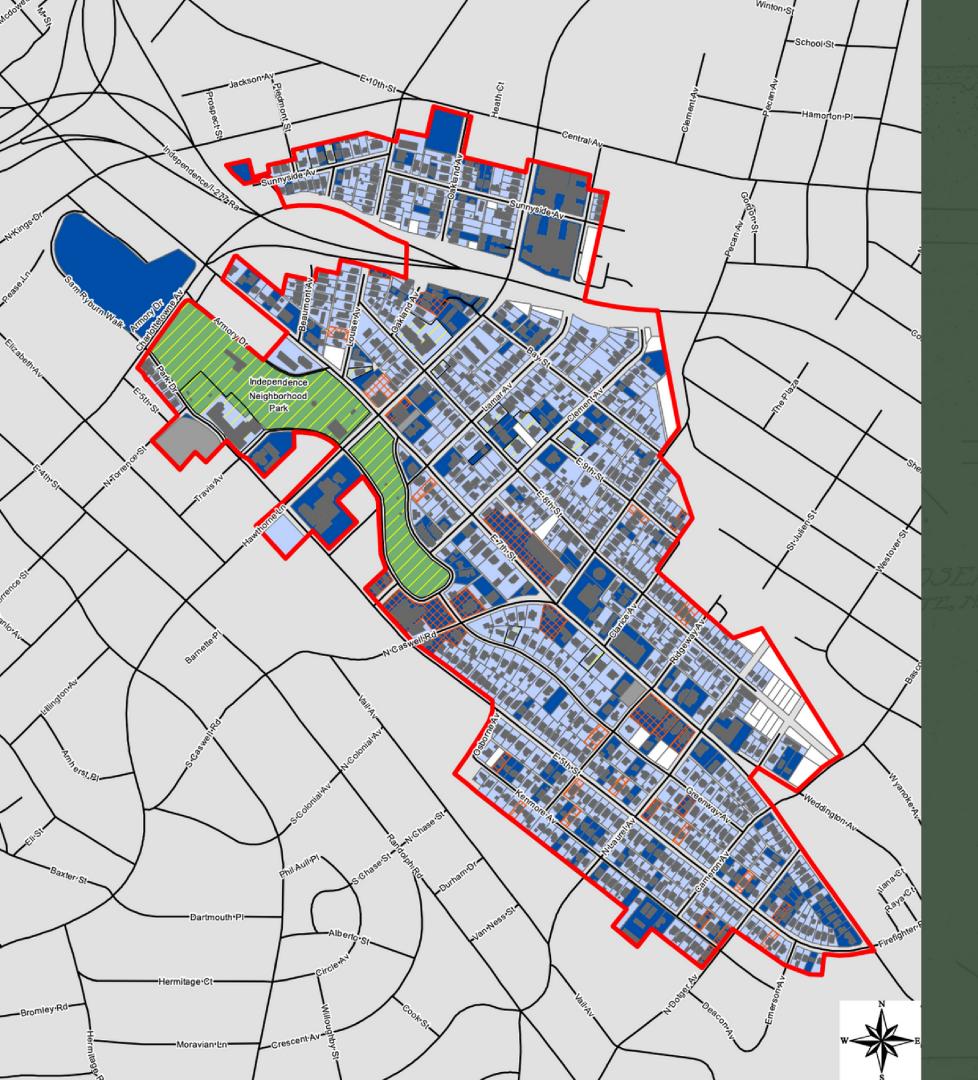

APRIL 2023

The HDC will facilitate a meeting including HDC and City Planning leadership representatives, our District 1 Councilperson (Dante Anderson), and community leaders to share about the project and determine support for the rezoning process

MAY 2023

The HDC will review the report and vote to support the effort or not and then send the report to the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO)

JUNE 2023

SHPO has 30 days to review the report and provide recommendations

AN APPROXIMATE TIMELINE

JULY 2023

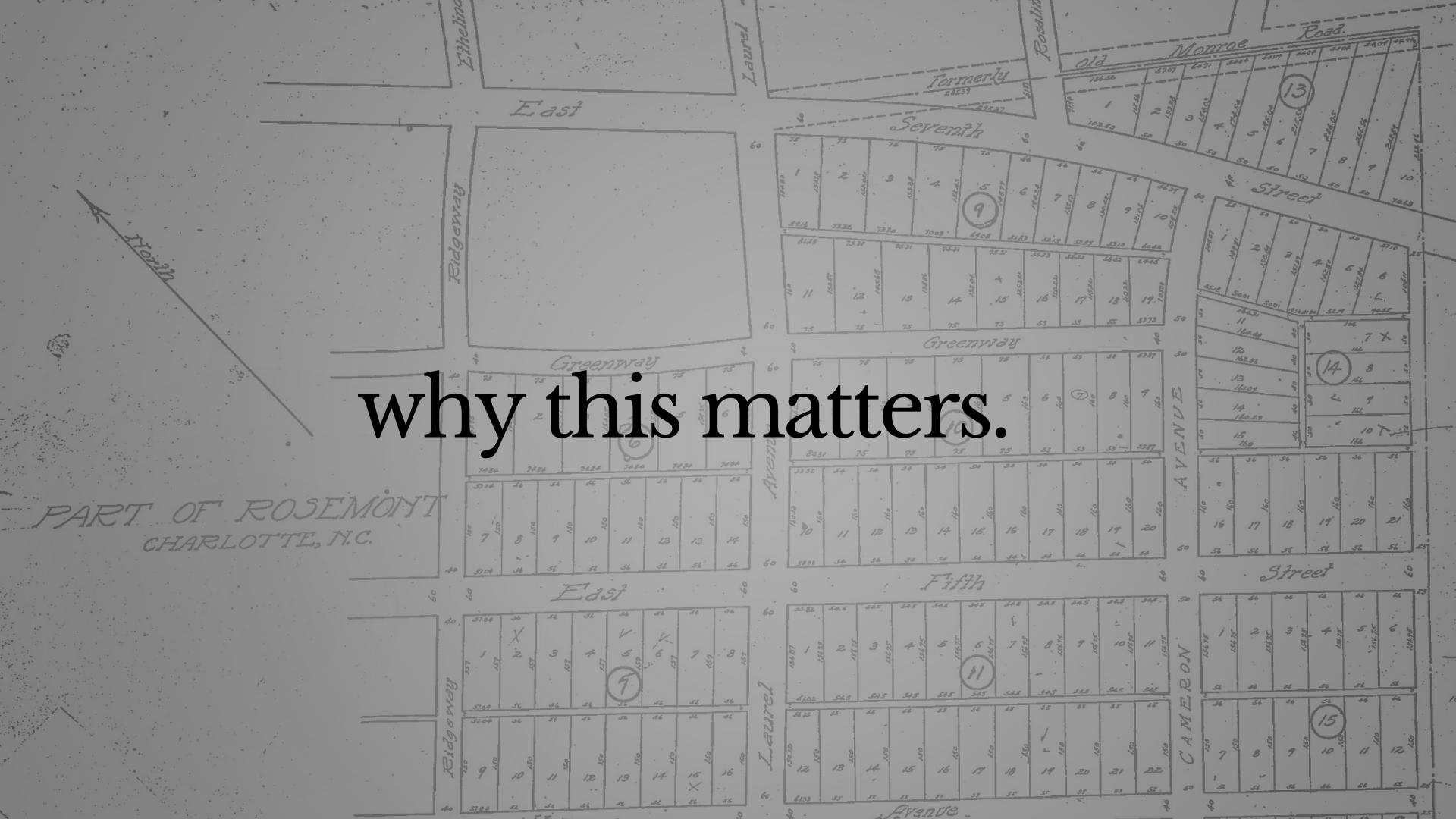
A petition will be circulated to all property owners in the proposed local historic district boundary to obtain signatures of support. (51%). The survey will be conducted by an independent vendor to ensure accuracy and neutrality.

SEPTEMBER 2023

Rezoning application will be submitted to City Planning (September 2023). The application consists of the completed petition, SHPO review letter, and Local Designation Report (property survey, photos, narratives). A rezoning application is required because a local historic district is an overlay district that requires a rezoning.

OCTOBER 2023 - SPRING 2024

City Attorney's Office certifies the petition. Project goes through required rezoning process which includes a community meeting, public hearing, and official City Council vote (process takes about 4 months).

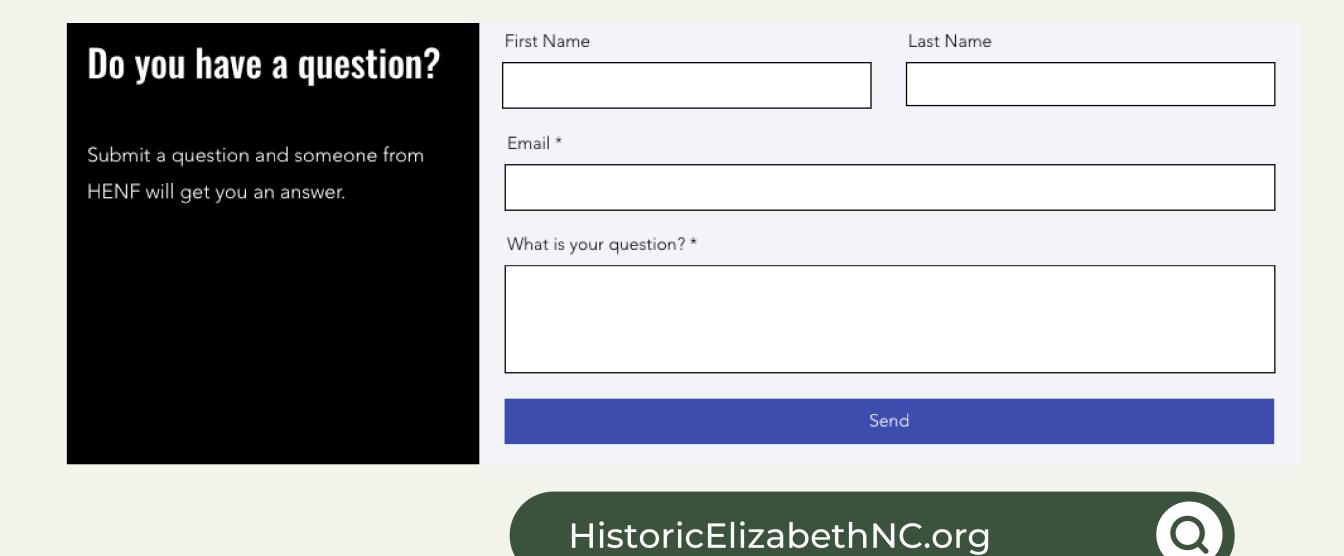
